1. What year did the World Fellowship program begin?
2. What amount is granted in an initial fellowship?
3. What amount is granted in a fellowship extension?
4. Does the funding come from your dues or from donations?
5. When you or your chapter make a donation, what form is used?
6. Can Delta Kappa Gamma members apply for these monies?
7. Where would you find a list of current recipients?

Answers:

1. The World Fellowship program began at the 1946 International Convention in San Francisco with approval of a project to aid women in war-torn countries.
2. According to the 2010 International Standing Rules, the initial grant from a World Fellowship Award shall be 4,000 US dollars per recipient.
3. Extensions not to exceed a total of 3,000 US dollars per recipient may be granted in subsequent years.
4. Income to the fund is derived from voluntary chapter or individual contributions, bequeaths and income from investments of the

fund, not from dues.

5. Contributions to the World Fellowship fund may be made by using Form 43 with the on-line contribution form. Both can be accessed at www.dkg.org under the Forms pull down menu and in the Contributions folder.

6. No. According to the 2010 International Constitution, these fellowships are granted to non-member women who are not citizens or permanent residents of the United States or Canada.

Last year a subscription to a popular children's magazine was added, and chapter members continue their commitment to literacy by keeping this shelter's collection current. The yard sale is an annual event and raising money for the CASA shelter home library is its priority!

Seminar in Purposeful Living

The 2012 Seminar for Purposeful Living was titled "A Capital Experience." Our hotel was situated in Crystal City, Virginia, on the outskirts of Washington, DC. The seminar attendees came from all over the world, and we enjoyed guided tours of the Capitol Building, National Cathedral and Arlington National Cemetery. One evening was spent on a moonlight tour of the historical monuments where a light drizzle of rain could not dampen the spirits of our group. Our time at the seminar was not totally scheduled. Opportunities were available for tours to Mount Vernon, Holocaust Museum and Ford's Theater. Some chose individual tours of museums, exhibits and public buildings sprinkled throughout the capital.



I watched presentations of international projects, and I listened to educators who had received grants through the Educational Foundation. I thought about teachers who wanted to attend conferences or work on National Board Certification, but they could not afford it. I thought about the need for intercultural understanding and projects that benefit children and education. The seminar allowed me to focus on the mission of the Educational Foundation and its commitment to support, encourage and assist with the improvement of education. Prior to the International Convention, the Educational Foundation presented the Seminar for Purposeful Living in Arlington, Virginia. Twelve of the 192 participants were from Florida including our Mu State President, **Carrie Frye**. Participants had the opportunity to tour our nation's capital. It was truly a well organized and rewarding experience.

During the past biennium, the Educational Foundation has given 112 educators a total of \$114,251 in Cornet Professional Development Awards. This includes our four latest recipients:

Seven Floridians Demonstrated Leadership as Presenters

Seven members of the Florida delegation demonstrated leadership by presenting breakout sessions over the three days that they are offered. Organized by their breakout session strands, you will find below a brief description of each. Mu State is extremely proud of their application, acceptance and delivery of information at the 2012 International Convention in New York City this summer.



Breakout Session Strand: DKG and the Future

On Wednesday, July 25, **Dr. Beverly Helms** from Bonifay presented ***As the SAP Rises - Strategic Action Planning for SE State Organizations***. State organization representatives met to review progress, shared individual state organization plans and discussed methods and strategies that are working. Participants identified future steps to support the development of SAPs for chapters. Participation was limited to identified Southeast state organization representatives.

Breakout Session Strand: Cultural and Personal Enrichment

On Thursday, July 26, **Lynn G. Kruse** from Florida presented with Patricia Gross from New York a breakout session entitled ***Finding the Purpose of Your Life: Personal Fulfillment through Goal Setting***. They shared how to attain personal satisfaction and professional success through the use of Jack Canfield's "The Success Principles." Both presenters were trained personally through his Trainer Program.



On the morning of Friday, July 26, **Ruth E. Pridgen** from Jacksonville (pictured on the left during her concurrent session) presented ***Turn Your Personal Dream into Reality by Design***. Attendees discovered how to turn their dreams, whatever they might be, into reality through specific design steps. They also learned how to develop the motivation to take that first step. She mesmerized a full house of attendees.

At the same time, **Sally Finley** from Florida presented ***Paper Crafting for Fun and Profit***. A variety of paper crafts were featured that could be used for chapter program covers and favors. Participants made a paper basket using scrapbooking paper, cardstock and ribbons. In the photo on the right, **Terry Stanilonis** proudly displays her creation accompanied by Sally (wearing glasses). This hands-on make and take was a huge hit!



Breakout Session Strand: Professional Practices



Also on Thursday, **Tamyra DiFruscio** and **Katrina McMenemy** (left to right in photo) both from Tau Chapter in Florida shared their expertise in a breakout session entitled ***Heightening Student Achievement Through Music***. Music increases student achievement, so they shared practical classroom applications. Materials were applicable for novice and veteran educators, as well as parents and administrators. Participants experienced exciting hands-on musical activities that everyone can implement.

Also on Friday, **Tess Creel** from Florida presented ***Getting Girls Interested in Math***. Participants found out why girls lose interest in mathematics, and they gained ideas that can make mathematics attractive and interesting to girls.

Are You Frustrated that the Florida Legislature is Controlling Your Life? You Can Do Something About It.

Among my teacher friends, I am unusual because I have become active in the political process. I don't know if most educators believe they are too busy to get involved, or if deep down they don't believe they can make a difference. Whatever the reason, most teachers sit on the sidelines and watch our legislators enact laws that dramatically impact our lives. Friends, this has to change!

Throughout the state, every current teacher I have spoken with said that last year was the most difficult year of teaching that they have ever encountered. Why? It is because of the new teacher appraisal system mandated by our state legislators. If a single act of our legislative body, Senate Bill 736, can so detrimentally affect our profession, then we cannot afford to stand idle. You must get involved in the political process.

The task seems overwhelming, but if each of us does a small part, it will create a tremendous impact.

1. Call each member of your legislative delegation and ask how they voted on Senate Bill 736.
2. For members who voted against the bill, send them an email or handwritten note thanking them for their support of education.
3. For legislators who voted in favor of the bill, get a group of teachers together and make an appointment to talk with them about education.
 - a. Let them know you supported them in the past, but you will not continue to support them because of their vote on this issue.
 - b. Let them know how Senate Bill 736 has negatively impacted your students, your class and your school.
 - c. Explain that fewer college students are considering education as a career, so if the climate in Florida doesn't change we will face a massive teacher shortage in the next five years.
4. Research the opponents of your state representatives who voted in favor of Senate Bill 736. Gather a group of teachers and make an appointment with the candidates to discuss their education platform. Tell the candidates you will work to help pro-education candidates win, and then follow through on the promise.
 - a. Offer to call your friends and neighbors asking them to vote for the pro-education candidate.
 - b. Offer to walk a precinct handing out literature for the pro-education candidate.
 - c. Offer to organize or participate in a sign waving campaign at a major intersection.

Commit an hour to meet with your state representative and senator. If your legislators received requests for appointments from over fifty educators in their district over the upcoming months, think of the impact. Our founders fought for better conditions for teachers, and we are the blessed recipients. I am asking you to do the same for the future teachers who are currently students in our classrooms. Remember our call to action:

"Onward! tis our sisters need us,
Courage, Faith and Honor lead us!
Wrongs in truth and justice, heed us,
Firmly shall we stand!"

Criteria for Mu State Communications Award

Start now so that your chapter can be recognized by the Mu State Communications Committee at the 2013 Mu State Convention. There are different levels of recognition depending on the number of points accumulated. You do not have to achieve all criteria to be recognized. Earn the maximum number of points possible, then submit your file or documentation of communication efforts by **April 1, 2013**.

1. Chapter has a website and is linked to International. (25 points)
2. Chapter has a social media page with members participating. (10 points)
3. Chapter communicates with members at least 5 times annually. (15 points)
4. Maintains communications with members without computers, emails, etc. (10 points)
5. Information board displayed at district meeting or in community. (10 points)
6. Submits article to **Florida Rays**. (5 points)
7. Chapter submits news releases to local media. (10+ points)
8. Chapter represented at Fall Workshop/ district meeting/ and meets deadline for submission. (10 points)
