

Okay! Get a piece of paper, write a few things down that are important to your chapter, make some copies, and pass them out at your meeting. Take pictures of it and send it to the C&M committee. It’s a START.

“It’s too expensive to mail to all our members.”

Boy, you sure are right about that! Create an e-mail distribution list and send it out to all your members electronically! Easy-peezy-lemon-squeezy! BUT, don’t forget to cross that digital divide and make a FEW copies for hand-delivery or mailing to those sisters who don’t use technology.

“We don’t know what to put in a newsletter.”

Well, include your meeting schedule. Put the minutes of your last meeting, for those who were unable to attend, AND for everyone to review to save time at your next meeting. List upcoming events. List birthdays. Have a recipe page. Talk about your service projects. Highlight a Member-of-the-Month: what does/did she teach? How long has she been a member? Does she have kids/grandkids/pets/hobbies? Include a letter from your president – and maybe your other officers – and even your committees! It doesn’t have to be long OR fancy, but it can be both long AND fancy, and it can turn into something that your members (and everyone else on your distribution list) looks forward to receiving each month!

Fair enough. But ask for help. Contact your district’s C&M committee representative and say “I want to start a newsletter for my chapter, but I need some guidance,” and that individual will give you an idea on how to get started – and will hook you up with some resources. E-mail me, and I’ll give you some ideas. Just move forward... what do you have to lose?

Please, don’t hesitate to reach out to me, or to your district’s C&M committee representative, if you need our support! We’re here to make sure that your communication is clear, and your marketing is on-point! Take care!

The Bylaws Committee urges you to examine the Florida State Organization bylaws and submit any changes to the committee for consideration at the State Convention in 2021.

Since the DKG International Convention will be held in 2020, the committee may need to make changes based upon what happens in Philadelphia. You have plenty of time to think about and consider any changes you may recommend. We just wanted to give you a heads up and to remind you that any proposed changes to the bylaws must be published in the **Florida Rays** at least 60 days prior to the State Convention. Any proposed changes should be submitted to the committee prior to November 1, 2020.

To chapter presidents, you should also revisit your chapter rules to make sure they are in compliance with both Florida State’s and DKG International’s documents. Parliamentary Moment: “The Importance of the Agenda”

Have you experienced a meeting that was well planned with much accomplished in a short amount of time? That could be your chapter meetings!

By starting a week or two prior to the meeting date, you will be able to get all of the steps done before the meeting and look forward to presiding at the meeting. As teachers, we prepare for our class presentations, which is the same process when chairing a meeting.

Here are some recommendations:

Write the Agenda Draft -Send the ‘draft’ out to the members at least 3-4 days ahead of time
-Request any changes come back to you by a certain day and time
-Update the agenda and resend (not a draft)

Use a script - The president (chair) should use a script that is written for that meeting’s agenda. If using a microphone during the meeting, practice with a microphone (a karaoke machine will work in a pinch), practice reading the script, and turning the pages.

The first time that you do this, it will remind you of a clown juggling balls in the air. Practice does make for a better chair. This is an example of a meeting script:

Call to Order - On time and with one rap of gavel. “It is 5:30 PM and the meeting will come to order.”

Opening Ceremonies (optional) – Invocation, Pledge of Allegiance, Inspiration, and/or introductions

Establishing a Quorum - Attendance sign-in vs Roll call

Standard Order of Business

Minutes

Reports of officers, boards and standing committees

Special committee reports

Special orders

Unfinished business

New business



Closing Activities -Good of the Order/Announcements/Program

Announcements - Notice of the next meeting: place, date and time

Program – Speaker (informational or educational) and may be placed elsewhere in the agenda

Adjourn - [Rap gavel once.] The meeting is adjourned, at ___ PM.”

Make the meetings enjoyable. If the presiding officer is confident and relaxed, the meeting will be enjoyed by the members. Good business meetings keep a chapter healthy and growing. Make your goal this year to support your chapter officers and attend the chapter meetings. Remember, a meeting that will get the members to come to the next meeting is one that is informative and usually finished within an hour.




They Called Us Enemy

On February 20, 2020, the California State Assembly unanimously passed a resolution apologizing more than 78 years ago for discriminating against 120,000 Japanese-Americans and helping the U.S. government send


them to internment camps during World War II.

Published in 2019, ***They Called Us Enemy*** is an autobiographical account of this experience. The Reading Counts! level is targeted as grade 5.2, and its Lexile Level is 680.
