
My DKG sister, Annie Dougherty, has been a great help during the past 3 1/2 weeks. I'm unsure what I would have done without her .

The President's Voice

The success of the Florida State Organization (FSO) depends on the commitment and loyalty of its members, which can only be achieved through dedication and determination. As we move forward with technological advancements, it is essential to continuously update our protocols, tools, and training to recruit critical women educators successfully. We must also bridge the generational divide and transition to an electronic format while accommodating long-time members.

Our goal is to become a competitive organization that upholds the mission and vision of DKG and supports women educators in today's society. By doing so, we can ensure that the legacy of the Florida State Organization makes a difference for future educators. We aim to inspire members to appreciate the uniqueness of DKG and the power this organization embodies to change one's life for the better.

Our biennium theme, "Florida DKG Actively Engaging in Advocacy" highlights the importance of advocacy in supporting our DKG purposes. At our September Florida State Organization Fall Meeting, we held three-hourlong breakout sessions that focused on advocacy and how crucial it is to uphold the vision and mission of DKG. The sessions were as follows:

- 1. Advocacy for DKG: The Purposes of DKG emphasize the importance of committee work, facilitating breakout sessions, serving as chapter/state officers, sharing talents and gifts, and participating in various options such as attending chapter, state, and international conferences and conventions. All members share the responsibility of ensuring the organization thrives. Educational Excellence and Membership chairs Dr. Jackie Green and Ann Comforter facilitated an outstanding interactive session focusing on "mentoring" towards sustaining members' ability to succeed in the organization.
- 2. Legislative Advocacy: This session upheld two of the seven purposes of DKG. The Florida State Organization advocates for legislation impacting the profession and education of Florida students. Identifying our efforts through a non-partisan lens ensures our members have a voice advocating for "issues of concern" as we engage with policymakers locally and at the state level. The Legislation Committee, chaired by Dr. Vivian Posey, presented an excellent opportunity for members interested in legislative advocacy to enhance their knowledge of current issues and positively interact with their representatives.

3. Advocacy for Personal and Professional Growth: This session produced a variety of experiences for members earmarking Purposes 1, 2, 3, 5, and 6. Members are encouraged to pursue advanced degrees, seek financial support for their professional training endeavors, and write grants for the classroom through grants and scholarship opportunities. In addition, individual members are encouraged to facilitate breakout sessions in which their expertise is shared with members in a breakout session format. This past September featured a long-committed member, **Pat Smith**, who shared her passion for planning trips.

Pat's breakout session unknowingly created a unique outcome towards bridging the gap between generations of members. Pat is an average technology user of her phone, texting, emailing, and using a processor for writing. When asked to share her passion for planning trips as a breakout session topic, she required several days to consider the request. Pat agreed and began typing an outline for a printed fill-in-by-hand booklet, earmarking areas for writing in travel themes, accommodations, transportation, tourist attractions, and dining options.

The room setup included round tables to accommodate groups of six women, one from each of the six districts in Florida. Pat's exhibits were handwritten and posted around the room. Each group relied on their phones and maps of Florida furnished by Pat's careful planning.

The feedback from the breakout session was overwhelmingly positive. Comments, such as a fun activity and how wonderful it was to bond with other women, deemed this session a success. Fulfilling Purpose1 is easily recognized. The outcome of the session produced a variety of traveling booklets from panhandle, northeast, central, northwest, southeast, and southwest Florida, which correlates with our six districts. This was a teachable moment, for sure.

A unique and decisive moment in bridging the generational gap between our members occurred when a technologically experienced member asked Pat if she could take the booklets as they were completed and post them on the FSO's state website with embedded links added in for each location attraction labeled by hand within the booklet(s).

Advocating is not limited solely to legislative efforts. Pat's breakout session supported our organization's mission and vision by bringing members together, creating a fun activity, and generating resources that could be shared with members across the state.

As we think about September 2024, who will step up to the challenge of creating a travel booklet for the southeast region to which Florida belongs? And, looking forward to the Convention in April 2025, who will facilitate the third and final session on an international travel booklet? Oh, rest assured, using technology is certainly permissible but not a requirement.








KUGEL - Noodle Pudding

KUGEL is a baked noodle casserole originating in Germany (DKG member nation in 1976) and is often served on Jewish holidays. I enjoy this as a dessert treat and it can also be served as part of your Brunch.



2 Tbsp unsalted butter cinnamon/nutmeg

1 tsp vanilla

12 oz wide egg noodles

8 oz sour cream

4 large eggs

6 oz butter

1/2 cup brown sugar

1 ½ cups cottage cheese

8 oz cream cheese

16 oz crushed pineapple






METHOD:

Preheat oven at 350 degrees. Lightly grease a shallow casserole dish. Cook noodles in boiling water until noodles are all dente. Stir occasionally. After 8 minutes, drain and cool.

Combine by whisking softened butter, eggs, cottage cheese, cream cheese, sugar, sour cream, grated nutmeg or cinnamon, vanilla, and drained crushed pineapple. Gently stir in noodles, mixing evenly within the mixture. Pour noodle mixture into greased Pyrex dish(es) and bake until golden. Serve when cooled.

The Florida DKG Educational Foundation (FLDKGEF) Board of Directors met on Friday, September 22, 2023, for their annual fall board meeting in Lake Mary. Members present included **Carol Ann Casey** (Chair),



Roxanne Berger (Immediate Past DKG Florida State Organization President 2025), Dr. Constance Besco, Geraldine "Deanie" DeFelix (Secretary Pro-Tem for Board Meeting), Debra Graff (webmaster), Dr. Elsie Gross (Director Emerita 2024), Dr. Beverly Helms (Vice-Chair), Connie Kostyra (Treasurer), Kathy Raiford (Secretary Pro-Tem for Annual Membership Meeting), Diane Revels, Terry Stanilonis (DKG Florida State Organization President 2027), and Ann Tikka. The Board missed Kathy Diesner, Yvonne McShay, and Vicki Simms (Secretary). After calling the meeting to order, reports were given by the secretary, treasurer, and committees.

Later that evening, the Board hosted the Annual Membership Meeting to give a brief update and hear from Project Grant recipient, **Racquel House** (SEL and Mindfulness Game Room). Racquel is a member of the SEL (Social Emotional Learning) team at Hollywood Park Elementary. She thanked everyone for mak-

ing her dreams come true! Racquel was concerned about students after Covid because they forgot how to communicate. She used funds to create a Game Room where students could earn a half-hour pass to play games in the room with a partner of their choice. Racquel designed the Game Room to build interpersonal skills to help students problem solve more effectively. She reported that they have seen fewer referrals schoolwide.



From 2017 through 2023, the Florida DKG Educational Foundation has given a total of \$34,152.92 for 13 Professional Development Awards and 23 Educational Grants, for a total of 36 awards. These awards impacted approximately 2,551 students in 2022 and another 1,584 in 2023.

Getting Ready for the 2024 Florida Legislative Session: DKG Talks to YOUR Elected Representatives!

Many thanks to DKG members who shared their concerns related to women, children, and education with the State Legislative Committee this summer through online and in-person surveys! These concerns were relayed to several bipartisan legislators during the Virtual Meeting with Florida Legislators event on Wednesday, November 1, 2023. A day long series of conversations, sponsored by the Legislative Committee and moderated by Chair, **Vivian Posey** and US Forum Liaison, **Carrie Frye**, resulted in visits with 12 Senators, Representatives, and aides during the time when legislation for the upcoming session was being prepared. Key questions for the legislators centered on the increasing level of censorship of educators, the need for additional mental health services, safety on school campuses, and the alarming number of teacher vacancies in Florida.

DKG educators, (wearing red, of course!), were also represented in Tallahassee on December 12, 2023, when the Legislative Committee organized a day long series of in-person meetings with legislators. This was another opportunity for members to advocate on behalf of Florida's educators, and to inform elected representatives about the work of DKG members in the state.

We are grateful to the legislators who took time to meet with us virtually on November 1st and in-person on December 12th and for the opportunity to discuss several new bills that have been proposed for the upcoming session that will protect children and strengthen public education.



As a result of these meetings, several legislators asked that we continue to keep them informed about any proposed legislation that our members consider harmful to educators and children. Members can do this individually by contacting their Representatives or Senators directly!



She presented her succesful Buddy Ambassador (BA) Program which promotes kindness, empathy, compassion, generosity, and inclusion in the formative years of school-aged kids through student-led projects. It is aimed at encouraging children to spread kindness, embrace inclusiveness, and treat others the way they would like to be treated.

The BA Program is student-led and focused on the formative years, because we believe that the values that are inculcated in children during their formative years are what they will most likely embrace and act on as they grow. We also believe that having children empower each other, and be directly responsible for their behavior will affect greater change. With this early intervention program, children will grow up to be more responsible, compassionate, and empathetic individuals who will be and do much good to our communities and world.

Since the inception of the program, Buddy Ambassadors have placed over one hundred benches in

schools in Florida and the Caribbean. BA Founder, Loverly Sheridan, a DKG member from District V, who presented her successful program in Finland this past summer, has now partnered with her local chapter to introduce the Buddy Ambassadors Program, and place more Buddy Benches in Schools. The chapter recently placed their first Buddy Bench at Palmetto Elementary, a school in West Palm Beach, Florida, and is working on placing more. The benches are sponsored by local organizations and individuals, and are created by Jeff Industries, a local Non-Profit.

Janeice loves to travel and enjoys buying fabric from all over the world to use in her quilts. Since she donates for a cause or otherwise gives her quilts away, she can never have too much fabric! She prefers to hand quilt vs. machine quilt and often makes her own patterns and templets, so that each quilt is unique.

Janeice spends many hours tracing her ancestry and has recently applied for membership in the Florida Mayflower Society since discovering her twelfth great-grandfather was a Mayflower passenger and signer of the Mayflower Compact. She is also active in her local chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution, DAR, and loves to go to estate sales. She lives in Newberry, Florida, with her husband, Greg who is a true Florida native. They have two daughters, one son, four amazing grand-children and one great granddaughter.


DKG International unveiled the new DKG Fine Arts Gallery in mid-November, and their work will be displayed in the gallery for six months, after which it will be archived for two years.

My Name is Archie: Port St. Joe's "JUGhead Dog"

My Name is Archie: Port St. Joe's "JUGhead Dog" is a true story written about an 18 month old Catahoula who had the misfortune of getting an automatic feeder jug stuck on his head.

He caught the attention of the entire city with his ability to escape capture. For over three weeks, Archie could not eat or drink and refused to be captured. Staff from the St. Joseph Bay Humane Society made daily searches, and they received assistance from the Port St. Joe Police Department, South Gulf Fire and Rescue, Animal Control, and enlisted the neighborhood of North Port St. Joe in the search. Finally, he was spotted under a dilapidated house, and a humane society staff member was willing to crawl under the house and get control of him. He was wrapped in a blanket and taken to the vet where it was discovered that he was dehydrated, had a heart murmur, bacterial infections, and stomach issues.

Archie wouldn't look at anyone and was very distrustful of the staff. Being a member of the

Board of Directors of the St. Joseph Bay Humane Society, I was granted access to see him. Just the mere sight of him broke my heart because he looked just like a Catahoula I had 20 years ago. Since I cooked for my other three dogs, I began taking breakfast to him every morning at 7:00 AM which was chicken cooked with liver, sweet potatoes, and rice. His stomach issues gradually improved,



but he wouldn't look at any of the staff and wouldn't eat in front of anyone.

Archie became a Facebook celebrity with over 5,000 followers from across the country, and he was the face of the shelter. Over \$4,000 was donated for his medical care in less than two weeks. All of the profits from Ann Comforter's book, *My Name is Archie*, go to the Humane Society as a thank you to the staff who worked so carefully and diligently to take care of him and bring him back to life. The profits are used to benefit the animals in the shelter.



The beautiful illustrations were donated by a long time local artist, Diana Harrison. The production costs, formatting, and editing were donated by a board member, so everything is pure profit. Two years ago Ann adopted Archie. On October 14, 2023, ARCHIE FEST was held to celebrate 5 years of Archie and his contributions to the St.

Joseph Bay Humane Society.




