Making a Difference – Chapter by Chapter Dr. Beverly Helms, Florida DKG State Organization President 1999-2001

Almost a quarter of a century ago, **Dr. Beverly Helms** was at the helm of the DKG state organization. She was ably assisted by individuals such as **Dr. Elsie Gross**, **Ruth Pridgen**, **Nancy Thompson**, **Carolyn McGowan**, **Marjorie Cenower**, **Yvonne Rice**, **Myra Ponder**, **Gwen Carson** and **Vivian Landfair**.

Members serving as chairs of state committees during that biennium included Marjorie Allen, Joan Penland, Ruth McCrary, Morita Hadlock, Barbara Van Diepen, Linda Lentin, Ruth Smith, Doris Nesbit, Dr. Verna Norris, Janie Robinson, Ruth Smith, Gerry Hacker, Barbara Bonfili, Marla Thomas Cannon, Marcia Kirkland, Lunell Johnson, Fran Baumgart, Patricia Segrest, Fern Cleary, Dr. Connie Bivens, Nancy Kerce, and Jeanne Klender.



District directors included Sandra Smith, Bettie Lou Stewart, Kay Weaver, Peggy DuBose, Linda Valente, Janet Davenport, Leslie Rickabaugh, Roxanne Berger, Dr. Joanna Cocchiarella, Jessica Cooper, and Lou Burns.



The 2000 spring district meetings were held in Quincy, with 137 members in attendance, and Gainesville, Tampa, Okeechobee, Boca Raton, and Miami with more than 100 members attending each.

Evelyn Barron, International President, was the international representative at the 2000 Fall Workshop and 325 members attended. The late Dr. Carol Mueller, International President 2001-2003, was the keynote speaker at the first Florida DKG state organization convention of the 21st century with 336 in attendance. Past state organization president, **Maxine Smith**, gave the inspirational thought and the following individuals were inducted into the first state DKG Hall of Fame: **Fran Baumgart**, **Fern Cleary**, **Barbara Gillis**, **Dr. Elsie Gross**, **Irma Norman**, **Joan Penland**, **Sallie Shelton Culver**, **Ruth Smith**, **Marla Thomas Cannon**, and **Barbara Van Diepen**.

All previous recipients of the Sara B. Ferguson Award were also inducted into the Hall of Fame. Those in attendance included **Maxine Smith, Nancy Kerce, Jesslyn McBride, Dr. Connie Bivens, Marjorie Cenower, Yvonne Rice, Myra Ponder, Edie Smith,** and **Dr. Beverly Helms**.

The first international convention held outside the U.S. took place in Toronto in 2000. Seventy members from Florida attended, and **Dr. Helms** gave the Tribute to the Founders.

As the author of the articles about past state organization presidents, it was difficult to write this one. For that reason, it is the last included in the published histories of our state organization. I have been blessed by those on whose shoulders I stood, and by whose fires I warmed. I have had the unique honor of serving as the second international president (2012-2014) from Florida with **Dr. Eunah Temple Holden** as the first. Many of my mentors have gone on to their reward. Some are still serving DKG and for that, I give them my deepest gratitude.

May those of you who are younger enjoy the legacies of women past and may you become the leaders of today and tomorrow. Empower all women with experiences and opportunities to believe in and develop their own leadership knowledge and skills. The torch has been passed!



Influencing an Audience: An IGNITE Experience

My IGNITE experience, formerly known as the Golden Gift, at the University of Texas brought explicit guidance about how to build a future for our organization which at one time, for me, inexplicitly lay rather dormant and somewhat stagnant. In Florida, as an active leader in our state's legislative committee, my focus and gain of perspective during this time in Austin became my primary purpose for reflection and communications with my state's DKG leaders. As the classes continued throughout my time, my perspective grew as I saw ways the teachings fit into the organization's future as a whole. We had three classes for six days that covered topics such as advocacy, negotiations, communications, influence, and self-care. While each of these topics may be used for any form of life's stages or circumstances, they have direct impacts on our organization's future vision as we consider changes. The impressive and knowledgeable professors made presentations geared for DKG as it moves forward.

While I could write pages about the experience, I will reflect briefly on Professor/Director Amanda Russell's presentation *Rethinking Influencer Marketing*. We learned a number of important points when considering how to influence an audience. We must know our audience, recognize each chapter's influencer, caution against self-serving motives, and ensure a firm hold on what works today, while releasing the times of what worked yesterday. Social media is also a resource for LISTENING to an audience; thereby, gaining an insight to their thoughts and needs. Observe your audience to see what they are doing to engage in conversation. Communications must be built on a foundation of authenticity and trust, and we must use updated technology platforms and high impact presentation strategies. A presenter must be succinct, point-pacing must be quick, and content relevant. When we gain an emotional connection, it is a win-win.

I'm certain I can speak for all of the 21 Ignite attendees when I offer our kudos to the planners that made this experience possible. The financial and member support was astounding. I just can't express enough the impacts made by our leadership's efforts. I use the many applicable tools provided in all of my presentations, meetings, and brainstorming sessions. We all deeply appreciate the opportunity to attend IGNITE, and we've become life long supporters of each other.

Her society was not a sorority, and she wanted to communicate to each member how important they were in the classroom and that key women educators together could create a powerful force in the society.

What can we do in Florida to carry on the vision of this key woman educator?

State Leaders must

- 1. Communicate with the members of the state organization to encourage their individual chapter and state goals.
- 2. Support the implementation of by-laws and parliamentary rules of order.
- 3. Advocate for women in their roles in education.
- 4. Keep the members current as to legislative issues that affect educators, children, and families in our society.
- 5. Mentor the chapters in implementing their visions.

Chapter Leaders will

- 1. Communicate with each and every member in their chapter.
- 2. Set by example the vision of the chapter and incorporate the seven purposes into their meetings throughout the year.
- 3. Frame the meetings in parliamentary order with an agenda to include the Officers' and Committees' reports.
- 4. Communicate to members the important news and information from the state, international and chapter members.
- 5. Advocate for their members in the workplace and keep the community informed as to the purpose of the chapter.
- 6. Offer members the opportunity to attend state meetings by giving an allowance for registration.
- 7. Offer some support for their dues if it becomes difficult to continue membership.

Chapter Members

- 1. Communicate with each other.
- 2. Support the vision of their chapters.
- 3. Communicate with the state members at state functions how each chapter is successful and how the chapters can move forward in their vision.
- 4. Volunteer and become part of the chapter/state leadership.
- 5. Advocate for each other in the workplace.
- 6. Be informed of legislative issues and support your chapter members who desire to be in leadership.
- 7. Attend meetings, call members to give them a ride, check on members who haven't attended recently,
- 8. Keep the personal information of all members current, especially in the event of filing a Form 6 for the state.

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Parliamentary Moment: Let's Learn About Parliamentary Procedure and Have Great Meetings

When I mention that I love talking about parliamentary procedure, I can see the silent eye rolls or the look of horror in others' eyes. How can parliamentary procedures be fun or interesting and help our meetings?

I have chaired many meetings, and in looking back, the members must have thought that they could have had a better time watching paint dry at home. But, with training, I want to believe that the meetings that I currently chair are:

1. moving along according to the agenda to accomplish the most in the least amount of time,

2. the business of the organization is being done in a fair and orderly manner, and

3. the members are actively participating in the organization which means that the organization is healthy.

For the Gamma Nu Chapter, the last six presidents attended a six week parliamentary training session offered by our local Charlotte County Parliamentarians Unit. The classes reviewed the need to use Robert's Rules of Order, but also gave the incoming president knowledge and confidence. Besides this training, these presidents attended a Florida State Organization's Jesslyn McBride Leadership Seminar.

Gamma Nu has been successful due to:

1. parliamentary procedures training before the president takes office,

2. incoming presidents attending the Jesslyn McBride Leadership Seminar,

- 3. a parliamentarian is required at all chapter and executive board meetings,
- 4. a dedicated executive board that meets in person and via zoom,

5. chapter meetings that are planned in May for the upcoming year with designated members to host each meeting,

6. active recruitment of potential members, membership approval, an orientation program, and induction ceremony,

7. a book club with the book selections chosen by the chapter members,

8. a strong finance committee that prepares an annual budget for membership approval,

9. projects that are inclusive of all members includung January's Fashion Show fundraiser, The Main Event, and the October Literacy Workshop which is an outreach to our teaching community,

10. an active scholarship committee that grants, with membership approval, scholarships to qualified local high school graduates with continued financial support throughout their higher education years.

The things that make Gamma Nu successful may not be what will make your chapter successful, but the main ingredient is to have meetings that the members want to attend, participate in, and become leaders either as an officer, committee chair, or as an unsung hero who is there to assist the chapter in any way she can.



The first step is to have great meetings, an annual goal for the chapter, and to encourage members to participate. This may mean that you have your meetings in person, on Zoom, or a hybrid of both. Please allow me to attend one of your meetings via Zoom and change your mind about parliamentary procedure and your meetings.

But as educators, mothers, grandmothers, and citizens, are we passing on the legacy of writing as a communication and self-reflection tool or are we merely assigning and assessing? I do not have space in this article to re-



state the reasons why writing matters or the critical role writing plays for learning in most academic subjects. My purpose here is to recruit our members, practicing/retired educators, as a critical mass of advocates for writing as a means of sharing our lives with others. The "New Best Standards" and "Revised Reading Competencies" do not include writing as a means of sharing our lives as an instructional goal; however, as humans, even in the 21st century, we write to remember, communicate, imagine, and connect with others. So, how can our members/chapters support writing as a means of sharing human experiences and connecting with others? I offer a few suggestions below.

What can our chapters do?

□ Adopt a classroom at a local school and become pen pals with the students in the classroom. A pen pal initiative will take minimal organization to work out the details with the classroom teacher. Your chapter can take the lead in this effort making the work minimal for the classroom teacher. Get creative...get connected.

□ Offer a classroom/teacher mini grant specifically focused on supporting children's writing. Include the requirement that the teacher make a presentation at one of your meetings to report on the success of the project.

What can classroom teachers do?

To justify the use of pen pals, quote research: "Research indicates adult pen pals provide authentic writing experiences that piques children's interest in writing, improves reading, critical thinking, and integrates the curriculum." (Charron, 2007, LeVine, 2002, Boyaci & Guner, 2019).

□ Connect with a DKG/your chapter and ask them to become pen pals with your classroom. Work out the details together.

□ Seek out other adult groups to recruit as pen pals for your students.

□ Create a writing center that encourages authentic writing, drawing, writer's notebooks, and book making. Regularly use the "author's chair" as a way for students to share their authentic writing. Publish your students' authentic writing; place those publications in your reading center.

□ Model/share your own authentic writing.

□ In place of "boys; girls or friends" refer to your students as "authors, writers, story builders, and pen pals." How we talk makes a difference.

□ Write Thank-You notes to community helpers, school support staff, etc.

□ Integrate children's literature that features letters as part of the story. Why? Because letters are easy to read, have a pattern, use familiar vocabulary, and tell stories. These books act as models for writing as a tool for communication. A list of books is on the next page.

□ Apply for one of the DKG teacher/classroom grants. Information is available on the DKG International or DKG Florida websites.

I will close with these thoughts; writing is a gateway to children becoming participants and decision makers in a democratic society, but writing is often referred to as the "neglected R." Why? Because writing is complex, it requires time and nurturing to develop, writing is our thinking made visible, and human thinking is difficult to standardize. Writing begins not as deskwork/computer work but as lifework and offers opportunities for students to share their lives with others. Bring joy to the complex process called writing!
