The Florida DKG State Organization Awards Committee was pleased to announce several awards for the 2021-2023 biennium. The Media Friend of Education award, given to an outstanding media advocate for education in the state, was presented to Scott Maxwell, columnist at the Orlando Sentinel. The incisive wittiness in his column throws

a critical light on state legislative activities, and he is not afraid

to hold lawmakers in Tallahassee accountable regarding education bills that take public dollars from public schools and place the monies elsewhere. The Legislative Friend of Education award, given to a legislator in the state who supports education, was presented to State Senator Shevrin Jones (District 35), whose committee leadership and bill introduction has shown unequivocal support for DKG concerns. He has been extremely accessible to DKG members and shares organization concerns regarding teacher pay and retention.



The State Awards Committee was also pleased to select two recipients of the Sarah B. Ferguson Achievement Award, for 2022 and 2023. The Sarah B. Ferguson Achievement Award is akin to a "lifetime achievement" recognition, honoring above-and-beyond contributions to DKG at the chapter, state, and international levels over the course of many years. Yvonne McShay has been a member of DKG since 2000. She has served her chapter in multiple executive board offices, including Chapter President. Through her efforts, membership increased substantially, and during her term, the chapter scholarship amount given was doubled. She has also chaired numerous chapter committees. At the state level, she was District III Director and chair of the Emergency Fund and Educational Excellence Committees. She attended all District III Meetings since initiation and presented numerous breakout sessions when requested at district and state levels, in addition to attending many regional and international meetings. Yvonne has 42 years of experience

as a teacher at the secondary and college levels. She is known for tailoring her curricula for young students needing a second chance.



Dr. Helen Popovich was initiated into Delta Kappa Gamma in 1960 and served as chapter president for multiple biennia, as District III Director in Florida, and as state president in Michigan. She served as Parliamentarian for the Florida DKG State Organization and is currently serving in a second biennium as International Parliamentarian. She has chaired numerous committees, including the Board of Trustees International Educational Foundation and the Educational Excellence Committee, and received the International DKG Achievement Award in 2020. Outside of Delta Kappa Gamma, she had a distinguished academic career, including president of Florida Atlantic University, making her the first female president of a state university in Florida.

2021 - 2023 Florida State Officers

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The State Awards Committee selected 4 deserving recipients as new members of the Florida DKG State Hall of Fame. Its recipients are women who often toil behind the scenes, are perhaps unsung heroes, but whose efforts have been noted and appreciated by their peers over the years. **Stephanie "Sam" McCartney King**, inducted into **Gamma Nu Chapter** in 2007, currently serves as the Florida DKG State Parliamentarian and has served in numerous other roles, including



District VI Director 2016-2018 and numerous chapter offices. Sam has presented training sessions at Florida DKG State Conventions, Fall Workshops, and the Jesslyn McBride Leadership Seminar.



Dr. Vivian Posey was inducted into **Pi Chapter** in 2013 and is now a member of **Beta lota Chapter**. She has most recently served as the chair of the State Legislative Committee during the current biennium and is currently serving as Vice-President of her chapter. She had an article published in the **Collegial Exchange** and was elected Southeast

Representative to the DKG U.S. Forum in July 2023.

Kathy Raiford was inducted into Upsilon Chapter in 2015 and served as Alpha/Upsilon President from 2015-2021. She was District II Director for the 2020-2022 biennium and has also served on the State Bylaws and Legislative Committees, as well as actively participating in the Florida state legislative advocacy since 2018.





Dr. Rhonda Work be-

came a charter member of Alpha Pi Chapter in 1961 and has been a member of Alpha Kappa Chapter since 1975. She has served in several chapter roles, including president and currently treasurer, which she has held for over 20 years. She is also financial manager for the Big Bend Coordinating Council, as well as being treasurer for District I for multiple district directors. She has also been registrar for state fall meetings and the biennial convention.


- 1. Encourage everyone to read our wonderful newsletter, the *Florida Rays*.

Florida DKG Goes to the Capitol: Taking Our Message to the Legislators

February 21, 2023, was a beautiful day to be in Tallahassee as a group of twenty DKG members (dressed in red!) and guests from all 6 districts gathered in a large conference room in the Senate Building to meet with elected representatives to advocate on behalf of education, women, and children. While the 2023 Florida legislative session would not officially convene until March 7, Florida senators and representatives were already preparing their legislative agendas, attending committee meetings, and engaging with constituents. It was a perfect

time for DKG Day at the Capitol!

The fast-paced day began early, ended late in the afternoon, and was packed with 15-minute back-to-back meetings with legislators, representing both political parties. We are grateful to the sixteen legislators who met with us throughout the day to discuss proposed legislation aligned with the Issues of Concern of our members, and their individual legislative agendas. On Wednesday morning, additional meetings were held with those who were not available on Tuesday. During each meeting, the message sent to legislators from the Florida DKG State Organization was that our members are concerned for the mental health and wellness of students and school staff. They see the negative impact on student achievement due to an insufficient number of experienced, fully certified teachers. Additionally, DKG members believe that "permitless carry" legislation will make schools less safe. Consistent accountability and transparency measures for ALL schools in Florida that receive public tax dollars should be established.

The DKG members who made this journey to Tallahassee represent a total of 763 years of experience as educators! Their knowledge, insight, and keen observations made this a most productive DKG Day at the Capitol, 2023!

How is your chapter transacting business? Have your meetings become more of a social interaction than a meeting?

Unfortunately, there is a world of difference between a fun social gathering and a business meeting. You definitely would not want to go to a non-structured (social) meeting of a PTA, School Board, church, or women's group if they weren't organized. This also holds true for your chapter meetings.

We have all heard that "it takes a village to raise a child." It takes participation from the members to have a great meeting. That even includes the one member who attended, never said anything, didn't vote, but her attendance made a quorum so that the business meeting could be held.

Why do I worry about your chapter and how you are interacting? I worry because every year, and recently at the Spring Convention, there are chapters that are merging, and sometimes even worse, dissolving.

We are teachers! We are not afraid to stand in front of a classroom of elementary, middle school, or even high schoolers! Then why is it so hard to chair a meeting in front of our peers?

It is because we know the rules of the classroom and who is in charge. My position, as the State Parliamentarian, is to assist the President at meetings. I would like to be able to reach out to you, your officers, and members and host a Zoom training class once a month. If one person is interested and able to attend, then that is one more person to feel comfortable with presiding or being an officer or member.

For the first session on Zoom, I would like to discuss, Planning for Great Meetings: Who is Responsible?

Contrary to public opinion, it takes those assembled to run a meeting; the presiding officer is only the director of the meeting. I relate the presiding officer to an air traffic controller; nothing good happens if they are not in control of the meeting.

- 1. What organizations are you a member of? i.e. DKG, Church, Clubs, or Units?
- 2. What position do you hold in these organizations?
- 3. What is confusing or scary about Robert's Rules of Order to you?

Per Robert's Rules of Order (12th ed.) pg. xlix, these rules are based on a regard for the rights:

- 1. of the majority,
- 2. of the minority, especially a strong minority, greater than one third,
- 3. of the individual members,
- 4. of the absentees, and
- 5. of all these together.

The Florida DKG Educational Foundation Grants and Awards Committee is happy to announce the funding of seven Educational Grants for 2023. The maximum amount for this grant is \$1,000. Activity for the awards will take place between April 1, 2023, and March 31, 2024. To date the Florida DKG Educational Foundation has given 13 Professional Development Awards and 23 Educational Awards. A total of \$34,154.92 has been awarded.

Raquel House, Beta Alpha, will focus on helping students develop better interpersonal skills. Before and after-school time will be used to engage in playing board games. Person-to-person games create optimal techniques for social interaction. As students evidence a growth in their understanding of how to converse and collaborate, they receive a ticket to the game room. There they enjoy a "Fun Friday" or "Wacky Wednesday."



Delta Eta member Pat Johnson will "Energize Pre-Schoolers with the Wonders of Science." Using her collection of sands from around the world, Pat will introduce the National Geographic series "Jump into Science." Pat's grant funds will increase the number of microscopes per classroom in order that 3 and 4-year-old students experience that "ah-ha" moment when they see crystals for the first time.

"Touching Lives by Teaching Music," the grant proposal submitted by **Mary Keip, Alpha Rho**, provides recorders for 4 fifth grade Title One classes. FLDKGEF funding will outfit her school's students with their own personal recorders. Students can now take their recorders home for practice. The new, full year program will again be a regular part of the fifth grade music awareness curriculum. A final performance offers to demonstrate the success of the

program for parents and colleagues.

Bobbi Kelley, Lambda, in Lakeland requested funds with which to purchase furniture for an "Explorer's Corner" in her school media center. This comfy space will promote Reading during "wait time" before school, reading time in the media center, and allow grades 3-5 access to the reading corner. Using the Florida Standardized Assessment ELA results, Bobbi will measure the increase in reading proficiency due to the supportive learning environment the Explorer's area provided. This program affects a significant proportion of the population of the Title One School.

Patricia Layton, Alpha Rho, proposed to create classroom libraries that will support new readers in grade 1 and 2 using age appropriate, leveled texts. With Scholastic books bundles, Patricia will fill her library with both fiction and non-fiction books. In addition, providing a discussion opportunity among readers, as well as an independent reading area, will further support increasing the reading choices available to her students.

Susan Peters, Atlantic Beach, implemented "Curtain Up!! Light the Lights!!" Her drama program works in collaboration with the local theater "Players by the Sea". As Susan said, "Individuals look forward to this weekly class and the culminating production. Students are learning presentation skills, gaining confidence on stage, and communication skills behind the scenes. This summer a video component will show the students the before and after growth they gained.

April brought Miami Norland Senior High School's first "International Poetry Festival" using funds awarded to **Dr. Precious Symonette**, **Pi.** Her aim is to elevate student voices and bridge communication gaps in students of different ethnicities, races, and age – all using poetry. Students, faculty, staff and the community participated in "pop-up" poetry performances and placed poetry posters on campus as they kept the Poetry Festival prominent throughout April.



Embracing our Vision- Designing Our Future Carrie Frye – Florida DKG State Organization President 2011-2013

Other than the biennium of 1999-2001, all past living state organization presidents, whose histories have been published, have been featured in the *Florida Rays*. This is an opportunity to pause briefly and reflect on the accomplishments of those who carried the torch before us.

Carrie Frye was one of 11 children and the only one to earn a college degree. She obtained a Master's in Elementary Education. Between 1964 and 2010, she taught or served as administrator for most grade levels, while working in educational environments in Florida, Missouri, Georgia, Saudi Arabia, and Thailand.

Serving as officers during Carrie's exemplary term as president were **Merle Jones, Gerry Hacker, Dr. Peg Dunn Snow, Dr. Nancy Henning, Myra Pon-**





Carrie implemented a Friday night social during Fall Workshop, set into motion the sale of the state headquarters, created the Orange Blossom Ambassadors, and worked with **Merle Jones** to implement the initial contract with the Marriott Hotel in Lake Mary. At her Executive Board meeting in 2011, Carrie reported 183 members in attendance. 


be displayed on the gallery for six months, after which it will be archived for two years.

The biennial celebration of the Betty Thornton Arts & Crafts exhibition took place at the Florida DKG State Spring Convention on April 28-29, 2023. By all accounts, the exhibition was a spectacular success. There were over 100 individual items on display representing the work of 40 individual DKG members. Attendance at the exhibition was steady but spaced out so attendees could meander through with thoughtful appreciation for the creativity

We are all aware that DKG members are busy, thoughtful, and engaged women; however, the variety of talent on display can only be described as phenomenal. Paintings of every size, shape, and subject caught one's eye from the entrance to the exit. Bonnie Ignico Anderson's study of the New Smyrna Beach Causeway At Night was particularly striking in the way she captured the menace of dark clouds contrasting with the shimmering moonlight on the water. Her painting caused attendees to discuss what theme she was trying to express; but the overall theme was "thoughtful beauty."

Glass seems to be a popular and new art material. Kim Baggs' study of life through her Shattered Glass pieces was another showstopper. Her pieces combined thoughtful phrases about life's ups and downs with



beautiful designs using shattered glass pieces. The combination evoked real life challenges and triumphs that motivated conversations among the visitors. Her work reminded me of this quote attributed to Pi-

casso, "Art washes from the soul the dust of everyday life." Gamma lota Chapter's Inspirational Sea Glass Art pieces made DKG sisters excited about a project they could replicate. All 13 little scenes were not only

colorful but told evocative stories using simple shapes and natural materials. Rounding out the glass exhibits was Cynthis Tehan's fused glass pieces. Their uniqueness reminded me of a quote from Fromm, "Creativity requires the courage to let go of certainties."





Writers seemed to be in abundance this year, a novel series by Virginia Czaja (nom de plume Virginia Crane) caused quite a stir as did a memoir by Kathy Marsh who invited attendees to share their stories with her, a children's book, and poems by Elinor Mount-Simmons rounded out the literary works. Each unique and thought provoking.

Needlecrafts were in abundance, quilts, crochet, crewel embroidery, counted cross-stitch, and card embroidery filled the room with color and reminded attendees that art is often laborious. I would imagine the hours of work represented by each of the needlecraft exhibits would total in the

thousands. Each was unique, Some celebrated births, some reminded us of past times when women created beautiful artifacts that had a practical purpose, some represented the style royal families used to embellish their robes and gowns, and all represented the blending of beauty with practicality.



Carolyn Lang's paper crafts taught attendees the power of "simple paper" as an art resource, along with her Cricket machine and her eye for design. Her work reminded me of something Andy Warhol said about art, "Everything has its beauty, but not everyone sees it." Carolyn's work certainly showcased the beauty hidden in paper! Recycled paper and greeting cards were given another

life by **Pat Smith**. Her "recycled greeting cards" were lovely and practical plus they give joy to recipients; how do I know? Because, I have been on the receiving end. Creativity brings light and joy into the world in small, meaningful ways. Perhaps the most unique blending of art and practicality was **Linda**




Petuch's scrapbook memoir of her kitchen talents. It was a feast for the eyes!

I will round out this review by asking each reader to imagine the items shared in this short review along with the list of other exhibits, African and Byzantine jewelry, beaded bracelets, porcelain dolls, photographs, and



hooked rugs. Each of the 100 items were showstoppers, each reminded us of the talent within our ranks, and each represented "art is not what you see, but what you make others see" (Degas). Start planning now for the next Betty Thornton Art & Craft Exhibit; it is only 2 years away. What talents do you have, what beauty do you create that brings joy to others? Energetically accepts new challenges.



An immigrant from India, Dr. Mohinder "Mona" Jain served as both a teacher and administrator for American, British, and Indian educational systems since 1961, and has given countless years of service to schools across the state of Florida

She earned two bachelor's degrees from Delhi University in India. In 1961, Mona started teaching at Delhi Public School in New Delhi, India. In 1964, she received a Fulbright Award that brought her to Riverview High School in Sarasota, Florida.

While a teacher in schools throughout Sarasota and Manatee counties, Dr. Jain taught biological science, health science, and physical science at the K-12, master's, and education specialist's levels.

When it came to school events like prom or graduation, she was often the faculty sponsor who attended these activities to show her support and encouragement.

Mona said she was passionate about mentorship and about helping others move forward in their educational journeys. It's what's led her to other opportunities in her career, such as serving on the Florida Governor's Commission on Education. She was also president of the American Association of University Women and served as Director of Family Health Services for Manatee County's Head Start program. From 1990-2006, Dr. Jain was an administrator and adjunct faculty member at Bethune-Cookman University's Bradenton campus and at Nova Southeastern University.

A self-described lifelong learner, Mona holds half a dozen degrees from a variety of higher education institutions, including two bachelor's degrees, a master's degree, an educational specialist degree, a doctor of medicine and a PhD.

Of all the credentials she's earned, Dr. Jain says it's the PhD from the University of South Florida (USF) that is most meaningful for her, because of her family's passion for the university and commitment to supporting their hometown institution.

Mona earned many recognitions throughout her career. She was one of only 20 women in the nation to receive a community service award from the American Medical Women's Association. She was also honored with a life membership in Delta Kappa Gam-

ma and Phi Delta Kappa. From USF, she's received the 1998 USF Sarasota-Manatee Alumni Professional Achievement Award and the 2001 USF National Distinguished Alumnus Award.

In 2019, the School District of Manatee County honored Mona by naming a new middle school after her, Dr. Mona Jain Middle School. Cynthia Saunders, superintendent of the School District of Manatee County, congratulated Dr. Jain at the dedication ceremony.

In 2020, Mona was recognized as the recipient of the USF College of Education Dean's Lifetime Achievement Award. This honor is reserved for those who have demonstrated long-term contributions, achievement, and service within the field of education. A proud USF Bull, Dr. Jain said, "receiving this award is personally significant because of her strong connection to the university."
