Come with Me to Tallahassee! – **Dr. Vivian Posey** gave the highlights of recent virtual and in-person meetings with our Florida legislators. She stressed the importance of our women standing strong together as they represent DKG at the state and national forums.

CHAPTER COMMUNICATION AWARD

The Chapter Communications Award is presented to chapters who use modern communication tools to market their chapter and to promote membership into Delta Kappa Gamma. The deadline to submit the award is March 15, 2025, and all chapters are eligible for the award.

Florida has 63 chapters and in the past biennium, only 17 received this award. That's 27% of our chapters. We recognize that there is no financial incentive linked to the award, but there is pride in knowing your chapter went above and beyond to promote its great work. The new Criteria is unveiled in this edition of the *Florida Rays*, and we encourage chapters to check it out. You will discover that the listed criteria are all very attainable. In fact, most likely chapters are already fulfilling the listed criteria, so it's just a matter of documenting what you are doing and submitting the documentation by the deadline date.



The documentation submitted for each criterion must be completed during the 2023-2025 biennium (July 1, 2023, to March 15, 2025) and chapters that earn 70 points or more will receive the award and be recognized at our Florida State Convention in the Spring of 2025.

Chapters may submit their documentation electronically or via the U.S. mail. For electronic submissions, chapters must email all information to their chapter's respective Communication & Marketing District Representative or to the Florida Communication & Marketing Committee chair Elinor Mount-Simmons at emountsimmons@ gmail.com. If using the U.S. mail, send all documentation to the Florida Communication & Marketing Committee Chair at 317 Earl King Street, Apalachicola, FL 32320; however, it must be postmarked by the March 15, 2025, deadline.

If you have any questions, do not hesitate to contact your District Communication & Marketing Committee Representative or Elinor Mount-Simmons, the Florida State Communication & Marketing Committee Chair.

Deadline: Submissions are due on or before March 15, 2025, for award eligibility.

Florida DKG Educational Foundation Update

The Florida DKG Educational Foundation (FLDKGEF) Board anxiously looks forward to reviewing applications submitted for professional development awards and educational grants. Professional Development Awards are given to employed Florida educators to participate in professional seminars, workshops, lecture series, on-line courses, and other non-degree program opportunities that relate to an applicant's professional aspirations and/or current educational assignment. The maximum amount of this award is \$1,500. Educational Grants are available to be utilized by employed or retired Florida educators who design and conduct an activity to support educational excellence in Florida. This grant may be used to cover costs associated with but not limited to classroom activities, projects, materials, supplies, field trips, speakers, follow-up activities to support previous professional development, limited equipment to support classroom activities and/or other activities designed to be implemented in schools or communities. The maximum amount of this grant is \$1,000. Both awards will be granted this year for proposals that take place between April 1, 2024, and March 31, 2025. All applicants and recipients will be notified by April 1.

If you did not get a chance to apply this year, please consider the opportunity for next year as you learn about upcoming programs that will support your role in education. Information is available at http://FLDKGEF.org.

The morning meeting was followed with workshops offered by our members and community experts from Florida State University, Florida Diagnostic & Learning Resources System (FDLRS), and a licensed mental health specialist. There were several options from which to choose. Each workshop provided valuable information and insights into current education matters. Workshops included:

> Presidents 101, Visual Supports for the Classroom Difficult Conversations about Race; You CAN Advocate for Change, Leadership, Lessons, and Loyalty DKG Treasurers CAN Do It, Communicating with Gen Z, Hands-Only CPR You CAN Prevent Burnout Recruit-Retain-Reinstate, and Support; and Communications Award.

Each workshop offered a unique perspective and participants enjoyed and found value in the sessions.

The workshops were followed by a wonderful lunch, basket giveaways, and remarks from our **State President Terry Stanilonis**. To end our time together, **Ann Comforter** and **Vanessa Pinto** led us in the Delta Kappa Gamma Song where we enjoyed uniting with our sisters and once again pledging our loyalty to one of the most noble institutions, education.

Sharing Chapter Experiences

Alpha Kappa Chapter

Alpha Kappa Chapter began a relationship with the Southern Scholarship Foundation's (SSF) Lundquist-Hovda House residents on Stadium Drive, next to the Florida State University (FSU) campus, in 2017 under the presidency of Susan Womble. Susan was a resident of the SSF FEA House in the mid 1970's. Nancy Watson, who followed Susan as president, was also a resident of the SSF Pilot House in the late 1960's and early 1970's. Both members attributed their success in being able to achieve a higher education to the SSF and were excited to give back some measure of assistance to the students who followed. Nancy and Dr. Felecia Jordan Jackson, professor at FSU, have served as the co-chairs of the Alpha Kappa's Lundquist-Hovda Champions Project since 2020. They meet regularly with the house liaison, elected by the house members, and the house manager to plan fellowship opportunities and ways to support the residents.

The Southern Scholarship Foundation provides scholarships for students with high academic ability but with limited funds and/or resources for pursuing a higher education. Students who are granted a scholarship are provided a rent-free, cooperative living situation in one of the SSF houses. The residents maintain the house, purchase and prepare meals, and establish house rules, while attending classes at local colleges or universities. The Southern Scholarship Foundation currently has 26 houses in Florida- 16 in Tallahassee, 8 in Gainesville, and 2 in Ft. Myers.

Alpha Kappa Chapter became the Lundquist-Hovda Champions, in a relationship to assist the residents with items for the house, packing the pantry with dry goods and cleaning supplies to help reduce their operating costs, and mentoring residents in areas, such as resume writing, thrifty shopping practices, and providing local contacts for possible internships or employment. The chapter meets socially with the residents twice a year. The house liaison and Champion chairs meet regularly throughout the academic year to discuss house needs and resident requests for mentorship.

The seven-year relationship between the Alpha Kappa Chapter and the Lundquist residents has proven to be a rewarding project by promoting strong relationships with the residents and chapter members through our shared interest in education.

Beta Sigma Chapter

Beta Sigma Chapter celebrated a Holiday Party at the beautiful home of our **Chapter President Susan Mc Keown**. Members brought delicious treats to share, and we all enjoyed time outside by the pool overlooking the scenic canal.


Paper Crafts by Carolyn Lang Delta Xi Chapter

Just Call Me Honey

Kappa Chapter Member Linda Smock has written and released a new children's book, *Just Call Me Honey*. A personable little bee nicknamed "Honey" by her mother, the queen, talks to the children and tells them about her busy life. She shares about her family, her environment, the different kinds of bees, and her life cycle. Early readers also learn about how bees make honey and beeswax.

Smock visited with beekeepers and researched extensively to make sure the information shared was correct. A natural science professor and beekeeper reviewed the book to ensure the information was accurate. It is available on Amazon. Preschoolers enjoy having it read to them, and elementary children practice their reading skills as they learn and have fun with **Just Call Me Honey**. Interactive pages allow them to learn about mathematics and science.

The book begins with an overview of bees and the many species of bees, including the western honey bee. It next focuses on the homes of bees and their life cycles. The honey bee then shares how she and her sisters make honey and beeswax. It is interactive with children tracing, drawing, and thinking about math problems. Preschool children will enjoy listening to the story, and elementary children will enjoy reading and doing the activities. "Hi, my name is Busy Bee. You can just call me 'Honey.' That's what my momma does. She's the queen. She tells me to act like other bees. She says that means to work hard. Our work is essential. That means our work is needed for people to live."

When asked what the most common response to the book is, Smock said, "Adults respond with, 'I learned something!' They often add that even though it is a child's book, they think adults should also read it."

Smock was at the Lealman Honey and Arts Festival in St. Petersburg on February 10. 2024, for a book signing. She read her book to the children present at 3:00 p.m.


